he Maya world spans five modern countries and more than three thousand years of civilization. It began with the earliest farmers of southern Mexico and Central America and flourished into a culture that built soaring pyramids and developed sophisticated systems of writing and mathematics unmatched in Mesoamerica. Today, beyond the legacy of their ancient cities, more than eight million Maya people continue to thrive in modern urban and rural communities, keeping over thirty Indigenous Mayan languages alive.

I invite you to join me on a custom-curated journey through the heart of the Maya world. Together, we will explore the latest archaeological discoveries and the spectacular pre-Columbian cities of Yucatán, Campeche, and Chiapas. We will admire the vivid murals of Bonampak hidden deep in the jungle, visit Lacanja Tzeltal, home to ongoing investigations and conservation by a Brandeis research team, and marvel at the intricate stone mosaic architecture of Uxmal and the elegant carved sculptures of Palenque. At Calakmul, we will wander among one of the largest royal cities of the ancient Maya, where towering pyramids rise above the lush jungle canopy. We will also explore unique sites such as Edzná, Becán, Chicanná, and Xpuhil.

This journey is more than a tour of ruins; it is an immersive experience that celebrates the living culture and enchanting spirit of southern Mexico. Savor the region's magnificent cuisine, discover its thriving arts scene, and admire the colonial architecture of Mérida and Campeche City. We will also venture into the Calakmul Biosphere Reserve, a vast ecological sanctuary that stretches across three countries and protects one of the largest remaining tropical forests in the world.

As we travel, we will learn about ongoing efforts to protect the region's diverse and endangered wildlife, including the majestic jaguar. In partnership with local guides and experts, I look forward to deepening your understanding of both the ancient and modern Maya world, connecting history, archaeology, and contemporary life along the way.

HIGHLIGHTS:

Learn about Professor Golden's work in the Usumacinta River region with visits to Bonampak, <u>Palenque</u>, and <u>Lacanjá</u> Tzeltal.

Delight in local crafts at the Sunday market in Mérida and enjoy a private visit to Joann Andrews' home and library, which houses a large private collection of Maya artifacts.

Explore the incredible stone mosaic architecture of Uxmal, and the spectacular sculpture of Palenque, among other gems of Maya architecture.

Visit the superb yet less traveled sites of Edzna, Becán, Chicanná, and Xpuhil. At Calakmul, see one of the largest of all royal cities of the ancient Maya, with towering pyramids soaring above the lush jungle canopy.

Explore the Calakmul Biosphere Reserve, among the largest expanses of intact tropical forests in an ecological preserve spanning three countries.

Learn about efforts to sustain the region's diverse and endangered flora and fauna, including the majestic jaguar.

Brandeis Faculty Leader: Charles Golden



Charles Golden is a professor of anthropology and Vice Provost for Graduate Affairs whose archaeological research focuses on the dynamics of civilizations and the rise and fall of ancient states. Since 2003, he has led regional archaeological surveys and excavations in the Usumacinta River Valley, which forms much of the modern border between Mexico and Guatemala. His current investigations in Chiapas have helped to reveal new insights into the lives of the ancient Maya, and his research team identified the ancient capital of the Sak Tz'i' ("White Dog") kingdom, previously known only from hieroglyphic inscriptions. This work has been televised by Nature, National Geographic and Disney+, and featured in the New York Times and Brandeis Magazine. He has authored numerous publications on the ancient Maya and co-authored "Ancient Civilizations, 6th ed.," a worldwide survey of the origins of states and empires.





ITINERARY:

Saturday, December 12
Mérida, Mexico
Depart the U.S. and fly
to Mérida, Mexico. Upon
arrival, transfer to Hotel
Rosas y Xocolate, a luxurious
boutique property in the
heart of the city. Take some
time to settle in before joining
your fellow travelers for a
welcome dinner featuring the
Yucatán's regional specialties,
highlighting the vibrant flavors
and culinary traditions of this
historic city.

Sunday, December 13 Mérida

After a morning welcome lecture, enjoy Sunday in Mérida, when the colonial city center is closed to auto traffic. Stroll around Plaza Grande, the city's principal gathering place, and visit the nearby colorful market where modern-day Maya sell vibrant hammocks, embroidered huipils, and traditional blouses. Learn about Mérida's colonial history at the Cathedral, Palacio Monteio, and Casa Museo Montes Molina. Continue to Parque Santa Lucía and its restaurants and lively atmosphere. Enjoy a private visit to Joann Andrews' home and library, which houses a large private collection of Maya artifacts. The rest of the afternoon and evening are free to enjoy Mérida at leisure. Hotel Rosas y Xocolate (B,L)

Monday, December 14 Campeche

Visit the late Classic Maya city of Uxmal, and examine the intricate carvings on the Pyramid of the Magician, whose unique rounded shape and steep staircase make it one of the most striking pyramids in the region. Behold the two-headed jaguar throne at the entrance to the Governor's

Palace, a remarkable example of Maya stonework and symbolism. Afterward, continue to the seaside colonial town of Campeche, a UNESCO World Heritage site known for its colorful fortifications, historic plazas, and charming streets. Hotel Plaza Campeche (B,L,D)

Tuesday, December 15 Campeche

Start the day at Campeche's museums, which showcase the city's colonial history, decorative arts, and Maya heritage. Enjoy lunch at the Hacienda Uayamon, a restored 17th-century estate offering traditional Yucatán cuisine in a historic setting. In the afternoon, visit the Edzna ruins, an important Classic Maya city featuring impressive ceremonial plazas, a towering acropolis, and hydraulic systems that reveal advanced engineering and urban planning. Return to Campeche for the evening, where you can relax and enjoy the hotel's comfortable accommodations and classic colonial style. Hotel Plaza Campeche (B,L,D)





Wednesday, December 16 Calakmul

Visit the Maya sites of Becán, Chicanná, and Xpuhil en route to Calakmul. Becán is notable for its defensive moats and towering structures, while Chicanná features exquisite Puuc-style stone mosaics and the iconic "House of the Painted Lintel." Xpuhil is distinguished by its unusual three-level pyramid with multiple rounded platforms, a rare architectural style in the region. Settle in at the hotel, a new property located near the Calakmul Biosphere Reserve. Hotel Tren Maya Calakmul (B,L,D)

Thursday, December 17 Calakmul

Explore the Calakmul Biosphere Reserve, one of the largest and most ecologically diverse protected tropical forests in the Americas, home to jaguars, spider monkeys, and hundreds of bird species. Visit the archaeological site of Calakmul, a UNESCO World Heritage site and one of the most powerful ancient Maya cities, featuring towering pyramids, ceremonial plazas, and sprawling residential complexes hidden beneath the jungle canopy. Learn about ongoing conservation and archaeological research that preserves both the natural and cultural heritage of this remarkable region. Hotel Tren Maya Calakmul (B,L,D)

Friday, December 18 Palengue

Drive to Palenque, arriving in the early afternoon, and visit the Alberto Ruz Lhuillier Palenque Museum, which houses artifacts and insights from the region's renowned archaeological excavations, before checking into the hotel. Relax at Hotel Chan Kah, a charming property surrounded by lush jungle that offers comfortable accommodations and a peaceful setting. Hotel Chan Kah (B,L,D)

Saturday, December 19 Palengue

Spend a full day at the **UNESCO** World Heritage Site of Palenque, one of the most important Maya sites in the world. Visit the Palenque ruins, including the Temple of Inscriptions, Temple of the Sun, and Temple of the Foliated Cross, which contains the most comprehensive sources of Maya texts known to exist. After dinner, enjoy a private, after-hours sunset tour of the site. Hotel Chan Kah (B,L,D)

Valle Escondido

Drive to Bonampak, a lesservisited Maya site renowned

Sunday, December 20 Uxmal Campeche Calakmul Chicanná Xpuhil Villahermosa Palengue

for its stunning series of rare polychromatic wall paintings. Study the battles and ceremonies depicted in vivid shades of blue, red, and yellow. Then visit Lacanja Tzeltal, the site of the capital of a kingdom known from Classicperiod Maya inscriptions as Sak Tz'i' (White Dog), before overnighting at the rustic Finca Valle Escondido.

Monday, Dec 21 Transfer this morning to the Villahermosa airport for flights home. (B)

December 9-12, 2026 **Pre-Trip Extension** to Tulum, Coba and Chichen Itzá

Begin in Tulum with a welcome dinner and visit its cliffside ruins overlooking the Caribbean Sea. Take a lagoon boat ride in the Sian Ka'an Biosphere Reserve, swim in Laguna Chunyaxche, and see the jungle-shrouded Muyil site. Explore the ancient roads and towering pyramids of Coba, stroll through Valladolid, and spend a full day at Chichen Itzá, visiting the Observatory, the Nunnery, the Tomb of the High Priest, and the great ball court. Conclude with a stop in the golden-hued colonial town of Izamal before arriving in Mérida to begin the main tour.

WHAT TO EXPECT

This is a moderately strenuous program that can at times be both physically demanding and busy. There will be two longer travel days from Campeche to Calakmul and Calakmul to Palenque with driving times of four to five hours that will be broken up with rest stops. Participants should be in good health and able to keep pace with the group without assistance from tour staff. Each day is spent largely outdoors, often in the sun, exploring archaeological sites. Walking conditions range from level paths to hilly, uneven terrain, with some stretches more strenuous than others. While the overall pace is moderate, you should be prepared to walk and stand for several hours at a time (resting spots are available along the way).

Travel between sites is by modern, air-conditioned motor coach, with daily drives typically ranging from one to two hours on roads that vary from modern highways to narrower, winding routes. Most hotels offer reliable Wi-Fi and cell service, so you can stay connected throughout the trip. Some historic buildings do not have elevators, and steps without handrails may be encountered.

Daytime temperatures generally reach the mid- to high-80s °F, with early mornings and evenings cooling into the 60s. Combined with high humidity, conditions can feel considerably warmer, but ample refreshments and shaded rest areas are available to help you stay comfortable throughout the day.
